Breaking Down Barriers

This booklet is designed to tell you everything you need to know about Usdaw's Black Members Development Programme and how to maximise your chance of making a successful application.

If you're thinking about applying (and you fit the selection criteria) then why not apply? You've nothing to lose and everything to gain!

We've included some tips on how to fill out the application form which you might find helpful to read in advance.

Selection Process

Application Form

This should be returned to Paddy Lillis, General Secretary at Usdaw's Head Office to arrive no later than **Monday 10 July 2023**.

Selection

The General Secretary and the Development Programme Steering Group, in consultation with Regional and Deputy Regional Secretaries, will select suitable candidates for the Programme.

Selection will be based upon the information provided on the application form. Each application form will be marked against the selection criteria set out on the application form and under the heading 'Selection Criteria' on page 3 of this briefing.

Role Description

The principal aim of the Black Members' Development Programme is to encourage Black members' greater involvement in the Union and to address their under-representation in the Union's structures and events.

The programme gives you the opportunity to broaden your skills and build your knowledge and experience.

What Will You Be Doing?

Successful applicants will set their own personal development goal.

Development goals will differ but might include learning about how to organise and campaign in the workplace or the community, standing for a place on Usdaw's Regional Councils or getting more involved in local politics.

The Development Programme will combine classroom sessions run by the Union's Education Department with other learning opportunities that will be tailored to your own, individual personal goal, for instance, spending time at a union or labour movement conference or organising a workplace campaign.

Experienced Usdaw Black reps will act as buddies providing support in between training sessions.

Who Should Apply?

Usdaw welcomes applications from Black* reps who are keen to step up into new roles within Usdaw and/or the wider labour movement.



^{*}By Black we mean anyone who is at risk of racism on the basis of skin colour.

Selection Criteria

To apply you must have:

- Completed the 8 days (basic and advanced) Shop Steward. Health & Safety Rep or Union Learning Rep (ULR) training.
- 2. Experience of trade union and/or local community involvement.
- Ability to commit to the programme (20 days classroom and non-classroom sessions).

Tips for Filling in the Application Form

You have been sent two copies of the application form so you can practice on one copy before submitting your final version. You can also fill in the form electronically and return it by email.

Talk to a friend, a colleague, a fellow rep or your Area Organiser about what you plan to say on the form and get their advice.

Try to answer the questions by giving real life examples.



Personal Details

Please provide up to date contact details so that we can get in touch with you about your application.

Current Employment Details

We are asking for these details because if you are selected to take up a place on the programme we will need to contact your employer to secure your release from work.

Trade Union and Community Involvement

It would help to know about any union positions you currently hold or have held in the past. You might, for example, have been a member of a national joint negotiating committee like the Tesco National Forum, you might be or have been a member of your Regional Equality Forum, or be involved with your regional TUC. If you haven't held any positions within the Union, don't worry - we'd still really like to hear from you.



Please use this space to also tell us about any Usdaw or union campaigns you have supported. You might, for example, have themed your noticeboard during Respect Week, organised activity to support Show Racism the Red Card on Wear Red Day, have handed out surveys and leaflets on Usdaw's Day of Action on Mental Health, run a No Room for Racism campaign in your workplace or organised a campaign stand on Supporting Parents and Carers Spotlight Day.

Please use this space to also tell us about any work you've done to support members in your workplace, anything you've done to raise the profile of Usdaw in your workplace, or any steps you've taken to promote equality.

You can also use this space to detail any activity or involvement you have in your local neighbourhood, community or local politics.

Your Proudest Achievement

This is personal! It might be anything from:

- Recruiting or supporting a member.
- Chairing a branch meeting.
- Speaking at a union event or conference.
- Organising a social event.
- Taking part in a union demonstration.
- Raising funds for a charity.

Or it might be something entirely different – only you know the answer to this question!

Please Tell Us Why You Are Applying

Use this space to explain what you feel you would gain from taking part in the programme.

This may range from building your rep skills, to gaining a better understanding of what more you can contribute to the Union and what other roles you might want to take up or events you want to participate in.

This section gives you a chance to tell us more about yourself, what mattes to you, and what your personal goals are.

You need to make sure your application form shows that you meet the criteria listed opposite.



Development Programme - What Can I Expect?

Breaking Down Barriers is a programme for Black members (limited to reps only for the first year) that aims to address their underrepresentation in Union roles and at events by developing their skills and understanding of the Usdaw and the wider trade union movement. It aims to act as a steeping stone or a bridge for Black members' greater involvement in Usdaw.

Training

There will be a total of 20 days training spread out over the course of the twelve months you spend on the programme. These will be a blend of classroom and non-classroom sessions, working together with others on the programme and working alone.

Classroom

It is expected that 12 of these days will be spent in the classroom. Classroom sessions will be split into 6 learning blocks of two days on the following dates:

These sessions will cover a wide variety of issues including planning and running campaigns, understanding and navigating union structures, public speaking and leadership skills.

It is expected that the classroom sessions will take place at Usdaw's Head Office in Salford Quays.







Non-Classroom Sessions

You will be asked to work together on achieving a common goal.

Non-classroom sessions might include things like a trip to Parliament, attending a TUC event or conference or shadowing a member of TUC staff or an Usdaw official.

Coaching

You will be buddied up with an experienced Black Usdaw activist and rep who will act as a 'mentor'. Their role will be to offer guidance and support to you throughout your time on the programme and signpost you to other sources of support within Usdaw and the wider union movement.

Release from Work

If selected, Usdaw will approach your employer to seek to get you paid release from work for twenty days in 52 weeks. If your employer refuses paid release the Union will cover any loss of earnings you might incur.

Childcare

Usdaw should be able to help if you incur any additional childcare costs as a result of taking part in the programme. We will discuss these arrangements with successful candidates.

Reasonable Adjustments

The Union will make all reasonable adjustments to ensure successful disabled applicants are able to fully participate in the programme.

Travel

Travel costs will be reimbursed as will any out of pocket expenses. All expenses will be met by the Union's central funds. You will not have to ask your branch to fund your expenses whilst you are on the programme.
